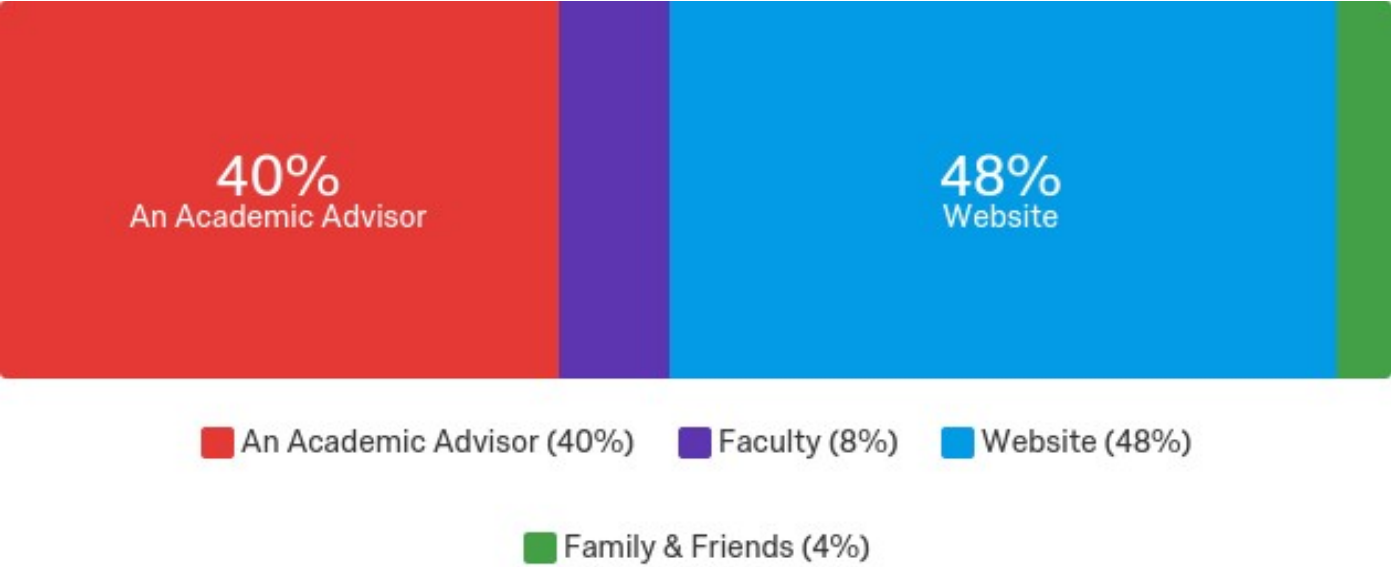

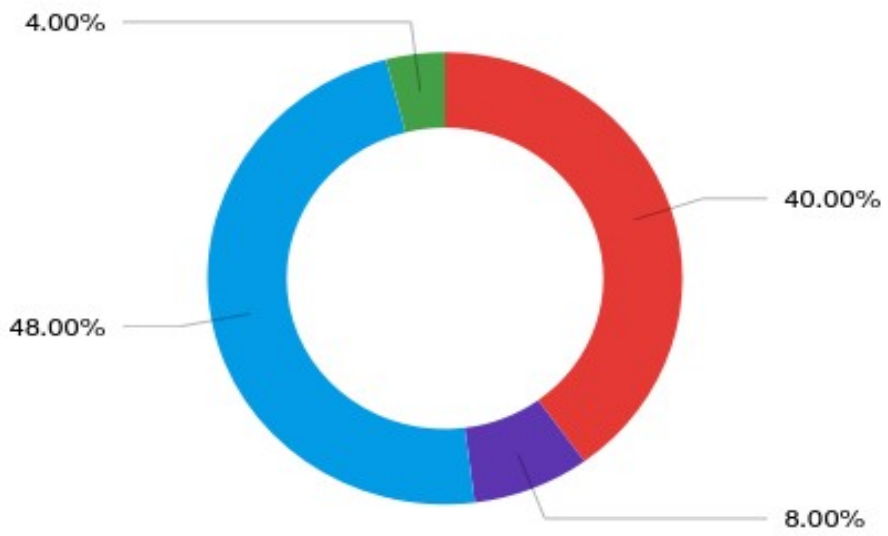

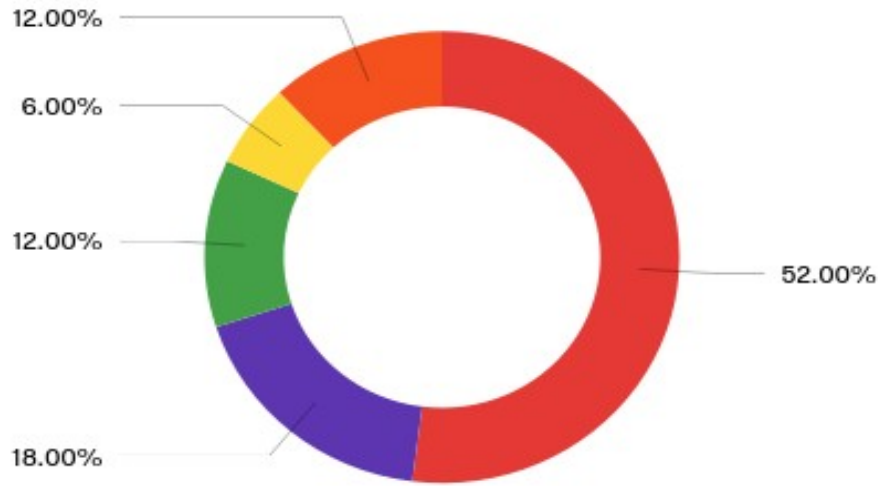

Q2 - What method of Academic Advising do you most prefer? Choose your top 3.



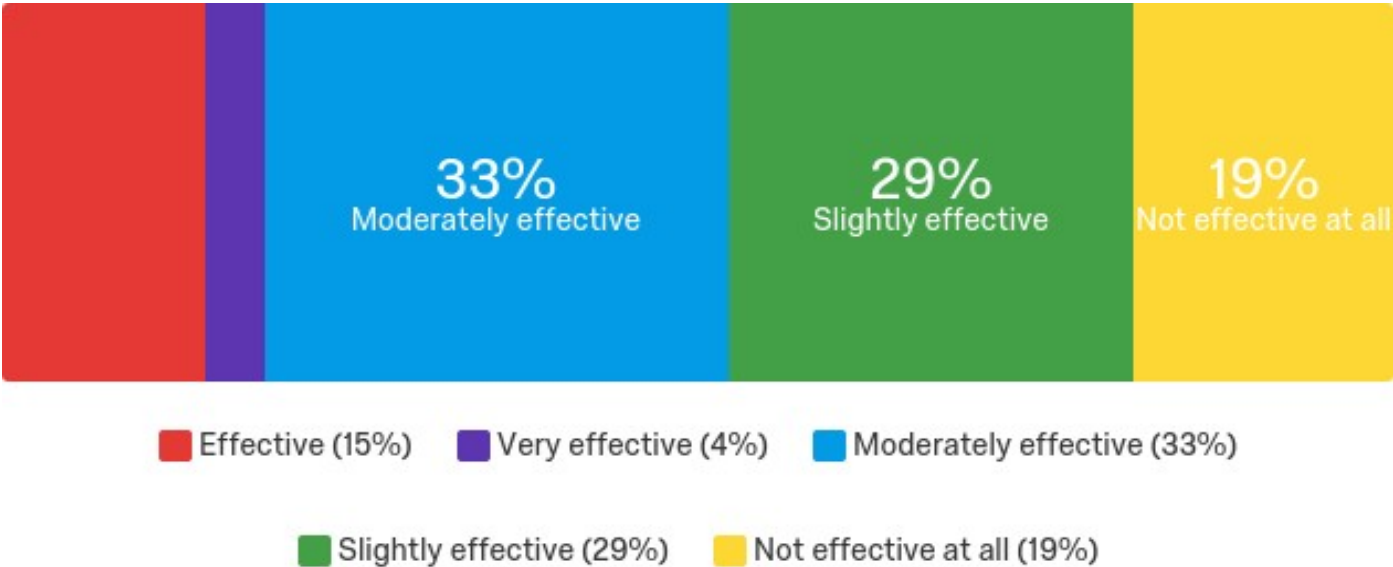

How would you improve the Canvas Academic Advising Experience?
There are lots of announcements, which can get quite annoying, maybe limiting those if possible.
I prefer getting the emails to having things clog my Dashboard & undeleteable items in my calendar. The school items (such as drop dates, end dates, are already in my calendar. It would be more useful to me to be able to add items to my calendar like I can with the school calendar because I can delete the things that aren't relevant to me. In canvas, I'd rather be able to see which assignments & tests I have coming up than semester calendar info. (Not relevant to canvas but the pick your top 3 question above will only let you pick one.)
There are a lot of messages and very few of them seem helpful to me.
If there was a way to chat with the advisor that would be better.
I haven't looked into it yet, but is there a way of interacting with advisors about individual questions and planning through Canvas? That might be kind of cool.
I already get 2 million notifications. This has overlapped so much and has become more of a hassle than anything
I don't use it, so maybe you can give more influential reasons why it is something students should be using. So far, I have seen nothing that interest me.
Way too many notifications
There are too many individual messages! I'd be fine with one per day or less, but sometimes I get many notifications within a few hours.
Less notifications.
There is a lot of overlapped and redundant information that I get now on canvas and on my umail. I would simplify it, so that students don't start to tune the announcements out.
I think that it is pretty good already. The only thing that might be helpful is tips and tricks of what we should currently be doing in order to help us prepare for grad school/future careers (volunteer work, when to take the GRE, etc).
There are too many notifications that clog up my feed. I mostly use Canvas for completing assignments and studying. I don't like that notifications about events I am not interested in make it harder to do this. This is why i'm in school, after all.
